Rock Island Plow Company, Part 1

My intentions for this article are to compile information I gathered from various sources and present it to you for your reading pleasure. By no

means do I consider myself an engine expert or historian.

I was inspired to write this article after seeing at the Highland Citrus Festival the hard work and effort LeRoy Overstreet put into restoring the three horsepower Rock Island Plow Company engine he acquired from

Larry Madole. The engine was brought from the Dempster Ranch in Nebraska to Vista in 1983 by Bill Dempster, of Dempster Windmills. Larry bought the engine at the Vista auction.

Rock Island Plow Company was established in 1882 by Charles Buford, part of a wealthy plantation family in Georgetown, Kentucky. Buford was a Yale graduate who came to Rock Island from Virginia in 1852. The company began making plows and other farm equipment. During the early 1900s, the firm decided to expand by taking on marketing arrangements with other manufacturers. After two previous agreements with Smith Manufacturing Co. and Jacob Haisch Company to market gasoline engines, by about 1914 the Rock Island engine line had taken on its final form. This series was built by Alamo Manufacturing Company of Hillsdale, Michigan. Rock Island entered the tractor business in 1914

by making a contract with Heider Manufacturing Company of Carroll, Iowa to sell their tractor. Rock Island finally bought out Heider on January

1, 1916. In 1937, Rock Island Plow Company was purchased by J. I. Case Company of Racine, Wisconsin.

A unique feature of LeRoy's engine is the cylinder and water hopper were cast in a single piece with the cylinder bolting to the frame. The engine

features a fuel pump system with a constant level fuel mixer, which provides excellent fuel regulation. Low tension ignition was a standard feature. Battery-and-coil equipment was usually supplied, but built-in magneto equipment was available at extra cost. These engines were finished in a peculiar light brown finish which compares approximately with Dupont Dulux Enamel No. 93-29607.

President: Wayne Mabb absent.


Vice President: Bob Swan absent.
