THE SEQUIM IRRIGATION FESTIVAL From the Top Left Corner

Greetings to WAPA from the Pacific Northwest! When I retired in 2004, I took my wife Robin and my small engine collection and an old 1928 Farmall Regular away from sunny California and moved to the north Olympic Peninsula, in not quite so sunny Washington. We live next to the Strait of Juan de Fuca, half way between Sequim (pronounced Squim) and Port Angeles.

When we got here I started looking for another group like WAPA and found, to my chagrin, that there were no old engine clubs in Port Angeles. After we'd been here a while we heard about the Sequim Irrigation Festival (some locals call it the irritation festival because it clogs the parade, car show, strong man



streets with tourists). Turns out it is the oldest running festival in Washington, with this year marking the 113th annual celebration, put on to remember the building of the first irrigation canals bringing water to the farms on the dry Sequim prairie from the Dungeness River back in 1895.

The festival is a town wide event with activities taking place over an eight-day period. Of course there is a queen and court, and activities including a contest, logging show, crafts fair, arts show, and a tractor pull and an old engine display. It turns out that there are some engine guys here after all, and since this is a farming area, lots of old tractors as well.

About a year ago, I met an engine collector, Randy Frick, who ironically, lives just down the street from me, and we have become engine and fishing buddies. Last May he said that he was taking a few of his engines to the Irrigation Economy, a Witte, a Fuller and





### **UPCOMING EVENTS**


August 8, Friday 7:00 p.m. Board of Directors Meeting
