This Old Iron—Mel Smith

I think all of you recognize the picture for this month's article. This was the brain child of my father, past WAPA member Mel Smith. Mel enjoyed the hobby of collecting and restoring old engines. I remember many trips he would take to the midwest and come home with the truck so full of iron it was almost riding on its axle. This was the early 90's so I guess you could call him an original American Picker.

As with most of his projects, the engine had to be doing something. All the items were restored and put together as one display. The lady pumping water (Sadie, as dad called her) was a store mannequin dressed in overalls, boots, and a red bandana. The bonnet was a donation from my cousin in Phoenix. If you look close at the picture you will notice the fancy cart this outfit was mounted on. This was my dad's signature cart design.

Mel was a retired railroad man and would collect old railroad items while he was searching for old engines. The wheels and corner posts



came from an old cart used on the platform to transport luggage to the baggage car. The wood was a 2x6 frame custom built in width and length to fit the engine. The wheels were spaced evenly and a large eyebolt was fitted to one end of the cart so loading and unloading with a winch and ramps was a one man job. This photo shows Mel holding a first place blue ribbon and placard he won for best display. I am going to guess it was Quartzite or Vista. The outfit currently resides with Julius Schnell in Vista.


Upcoming Shows By Rob Skinner
