
MEMBER PROFILE--Gus Lukrofka By Tom Millett

He's known around WAPA circles as the man who invented the motorized bar stool. In addition to that, he's the one that can be counted on to do a little "Show & Tell" at a Board meeting. He won't admit it but he may have inherited it from his dad, who could come up with unique and sometimes rather unconventional mechanical devices, a practice that was common in the 20's, 30's and 40's.

Gus was born and schooled through his teen years in Rolla, Missouri. At around age 15, his family carted him off to Colorado where he finished school. His first job was working in a gas station, and at the ripe old age of 17 he married Ella Jean. He got the courage to ask his gas station boss for a raise and had to admit to him that he needed it because he got married. Surprisingly, he got the raise. He's a little vague when asked how old Ella Jean was, saying she was about the same age. Don't tell him those marriages don't last. Ella Jean was his life long love until her passing in 2001, working much of her adult life business managing for school districts after starting out as a bus driver.



This month I am writing about a scale model engine that Dan Kato purchased from the late Larry Nelson collection. Dan did not know much history on this model of an IH Famous 4HP horizontal only that he thought Larry acquired it from Arnold Bohlander and Ernie Groce had something to do with it. I called Ernie and history started to spew from his brain. Ernie remembered that Arnold bought the kit unassembled but fully machined and ready to assemble for \$1,750. The kit came with 2 bases so Arnold gave 1 of the bases to Ernie. After reviewing the magnitude of the assembly process, Arnold decided to send the kit back to the manufacturer for assembly for a mere \$1,150 more. Ernie believes that Gail sold the engine to Larry after the passing of Arnold. If I am wrong Gail, please let me know. Larry would run the engine at shows and after some time the piston would start to bind. Larry asked Ernie for help and Ernie discovered that the o-rings on the piston were not the right type and would swell with oil. Ernie replaced the o-rings with the proper ones and gave the engine back to Larry. Ernie did not want anything for fixing the engine but Larry gave him \$20 for his trouble. Thank you Dan for keeping this piece of history in the WAPA family.
