

Cletrac General "GG" Submitted by Don Young, WAPA Safety Director

Cletrac General "GG" was built from 1939–1942 by the Cleveland Tractor Company (Cletrac) founded by Roland White. It has a 4 cylinder 113 cubic inch engine and a three speed transmission. It was marketed as the Wards Twin–Row and Co–Op which were painted red. The Wards Twin–Row was made for and sold by Montgomery Ward. The engineer in charge came from the Studebaker Corporation. Cletrac was taken over by Oliver in 1944. Oliver was purchased by the White Corporation in 1960. The General "GG" was sold to the BF Avery Company in 1942. Avery was sold in the early 1950's to Minneapolis Moline.

My General "GG" was found on a ranch east of San Diego, CA in very bad shape. It is #45 of 7527 built. I picked it up on April 30, 2013, and it was shown on May 5 at The Antique Truck Show in Perris, CA. On May 11 it was one of fifty five tractors at The Strawberry Festival at Cal Poly, Pomona, CA. I was invited to The Steve McQueen Car Show on June 1 at The Boys Republic in Chino Hills, CA, where it was displayed with WAPA engines, an Oil pull, McCormick O4 and two Porsche tractors.



This Old Iron--Klaus Duebbert

This old iron takes a turn this month to talk about the life of a blacksmith named Klaus Duebbert.

Klaus came from a long line of blacksmiths. His grandfather was a blacksmith, his father was a blacksmith, and his uncle was a blacksmith. You would say that smithing was in the Duebbert's blood. Klaus, of German decent, started to learn the trade at the early age of 3 by working in his father's shop. He did not continue the trade full time but instead ran his own business for 30 years as a Refrigeration Service Engineer. During those 30 years, Klaus would do blacksmithing as a sideline until 1997 when he would close his business, move to Yucaipa and concentrate on blacksmithing full time.

In 1999 Klaus created the California Experience which allowed kids the hands-on experience of early day life. Klaus would sub-contract with others and take his California Experience and blacksmithing on the road to various shows, some that WAPA attends also. In 2008 Klaus took on the job of a Wainwright, building wagons. Klaus was self taught as he worked with others and perfected his skills. In the

beginning he would purchase his wheels from the Amish but now he makes his own. The next time you are at a show and Klaus is there with his blacksmithing rig, stop by for a cup of his camp fire coffee. It will get your motor running.

About my Model A "Cutaway" Engine By Julius Schnell

My idea to build an operational cutaway engine came from a video that I had seen on U-Tube. It had been presented by Barney Kedrowski of Wisconsin. His video made me think about the cracked Model A engine block that I had planned to scrap and I had enough old engine parts in stock to complete an engine. The result is a cutaway or open running Model A Ford engine with water circulating through the radiator for cooling the one active cylinder.

This cutaway engine provides a good teaching tool for those that would like to understand how a simple four cycle engine works. I modified a VC carburetor for the small amount of fuel that one cylinder would require. This engine is running at about 200 RPM so that you



can see all the moving parts functioning. I also added a cutaway transmission, clutch, and gear shift to show how the gears function from low, second and high to reverse.

I drilled and tapped all crankshaft and rod bearings for grease fittings to provide for lubrication during extended periods of operation. I also run 50:1 gas/oil mixture to lubricate the single running cylinder. NOTE: THE ENGINE PAN IS CUTAWAY AND DOES NOT HOLD OIL FOR LUBRICATING THIS ENGINE. Observe the shaft that operates both the oil pump and distributer.

The spark plugs are all functional. I added an LED light to each non-operating cylinder near the spark plug to augment the spark from the spark plug and designed a separate distributor to light the LED at the same time that the spark plug is firing.

The keyed ignition and starting of the engine was done to make it easier for me to start the engine. The normal way is to use a foot pedal to force contact at the starter to engage the flywheel and crank the engine.

The color codes that you see on the valves and springs are blue for the intake valves and red for the exhaust valves.

This display shows all the moving parts of an engine as it runs. I started this project in my backyard shop and completed it in about three months. If you have any questions or comments, please ask or email me.
