

### President's Report By Bob Smith

Last year, Dick Bouma announced at a board meeting that there was a 200hp Western engine in an old building located in Ontario. He did not know who owned it but would pursue finding out if WAPA was interested in obtaining it. Something that large would require a permanent location to place and restore it. I contacted Dan Hostetler at Cal Poly and asked if the engine could be located under the pole barn at Spadra Ranch. He agreed, and the board instructed Dick to pursue locating the owner.

He made several inquiries and even went to the City of Ontario to locate the owner. The taxes on the land were being paid but did not know who was paying them. After several months of searching, Dick discovered that the land and the engine were owned by the Chino Water Company which was established in the early 1900's and has been inactive for several years. A friend at the Ontario Christian School presented Dick with a list of shareholders in the Chino Water Company. All the shareholders were land owners in the general vicinity of the water pumping engine. Each land owner was given 1 share for each acre of land they owned. The total number of shares issued was 469. Dick talked to the neighbors that are next to the overgrown building and they said that they would like to see it gone but the dilemma is that 120 land owners own a piece of the engine.

Dick asked the board to draft a letter asking the shareholders if they would be willing to donate the engine to WAPA. Tom Millett volunteered to write the letter and I stuffed envelopes and prepared for a mass mailing. The letter was mailed on February 8 and we will see what the response will be. We need 235 shares voting to donate the engine and all other hardware in the pumping building. Dick says that this engine is complete and protected from vandals and is well protected from the elements.

This would make a fantastic addition to the WAPA assets. We will give an update at the board meetings.

I pondered over what would be an interesting piece for this month. Nothing controversial came to mind, so I thought why not say some nice things for once. All of our members who are on our WAPA e-mail contact list have heard most of what I'll discuss because lots of mail has been flying around lately about big machines being brought to life. You have to understand I've only been around the 2HP variety of Economy, Fairbanks, Yeager or Hercules and only have knowledge of the big machines when I see Rob Skinner do his magic moving a big monster around on skids. 200HP was completely out of my scope.

Some of our members are finding these huge toys in the darnedest places; Orchard fields in the middle of nowhere or sitting on a wellhead of a long expired water mutual. Two examples of the big iron, although smaller varieties with only 30 and 60 HP each, are to be found at the Rubel Castle in Glendora, and I trust many are out there hidden from view.

Dumb me, I didn't know until a couple of years ago that Western was a Los Angeles manufactured engine. All this being said, my point is that it's exciting to know that our members are taking on new adventures with this big iron because there is no sensation like seeing smoke and fire bring them to life. Finally, modern day hobbyists ponder over the tremendous work early pioneers of these huge combustion engines encountered keeping these giants doing their duty each and every day. Keep up the good work everyone.

# This Old Iron—200 HP Western Engine, California Citrus State Historic Park By Bob Smith

This Old Iron is proud to present to you a 200hp Western Engine serial number 8162 built in 1926. This engine was delivered to the Riverside Highland Water Company along with 6 other Westerns in 1931 to supply water to the regional citrus growers.

This particular engine was used as a transfer pumper from the San Bernardino Basin to the growers in upper Highgrove, Grand Terrace, and the northern part of Riverside, from the 1930s to 1960. It is one of two of the original seven delivered that survived the scrap yard with one being sent to Salem, Oregon, where it is featured in a museum and this engine being transferred to the California Citrus State Historic Park in Riverside where it will contribute significantly to the citrus irrigation story of the entire region.

The engine was moved to its new location in 2000 and has sat

a Butler building since then with no one knowing how to get it running again. Well along came WAPA folks who have volunteered their time to bring this 17 ton beast back to life. The engine was first started on Saturday morning, February 8, 2014, and ran for 10 minutes. Now it was ready for a start-up and run on Monday, February 10, 2014, in front of Park officials. The engine was temperamental but it did run for a short time. What needs to happen to make the engine show worthy is for the park to install a large propane tank to supply fuel and the restoration crew needs to build an accumulator to control the amount of fuel to the engine. The original air start supply tank needs to be set up to supply ample air on startup. Good work guys.






