#### My View By Tom Millett

The guys that play with me at the Cal Poly tractor shop have heard this story before; perhaps many times depending on how many times I have repeated myself.

Back in the 30's, 40's and 50's farm tractor companies went to great lengths wooing farmers to buy red, green or orange. Most makes by then had battery operated starters, power take-off and belt pulley attachments. So, it pretty much depended on which color you preferred. Farmers chose sides as fiercely as armed soldiers in battle. For instance, in my part of the country, as a youngster, it was either red or green. Well, my father only bought red machines with a McCormick Deering logo and my uncle Oscar only permitted John Deere green on his land. So, growing up in that environment I was never exposed to the inner working of the Deere. Well, perhaps my Dad knew something that he kept hidden from us boys as we toiled in the fields riding Farmall tractors.

A few weeks ago, our little group of Cal Poly tinkerers were preparing a John Deere "A" for painting. As we were stripping it of all the sheet metal and taking it down to its basics, we were at the point of removing the cowling sheet metal cover. However, the steering wheel shaft goes through the sheet metal and into the sector shaft box. What now? Call our trusty consultant, Ron Haskell for advice. "Ron, how do we get this thing off?" "Oh", says Ron, "You have to pull off the steering wheel, then unbolt the sector front plate and pull the steering shaft and worm gear out the front. Then, since the gas tank is attached to the cowl and difficult to undo, you had best take it off with the cowl". I'm flabbergasted, to say the least.

Now, let's get back to my Dad and his fetish for owning only Farmalls. Did he know about this complicated and idiotic way of removing a piece of sheet metal from a John Deere? I don't think so. I only know that on all models of Farmall tractors of that vintage, you loosen the two muffler bolts and lift it off, pull down on cowling attachment clips on each corner of the cowl, and guess what? The cowl is ready to lift off; a task that takes three minutes. I have never expressed my view of Deere placing the engine over the rear axle to act as rear wheel ballast instead of at the very front of the tractor to keep the front wheels on the ground under heavy load. That, too, always seemed a little strange since wheel weights had to be attached up front instead to do the job. Well, that's it folks. Now, go select your color and perhaps I'll see you sometime at the tractor shop.


#### Note from the Editor By Carol Haskell

#### This Old Iron Mark Panzone, 1909 Union **By Bob Smith**

Shortly after Alaska was purchased by the United States from the Russian Empire in 1867 for \$7.2million, gold was discovered. Between 1896 and 1899 an estimated 100,000 prospectors migrated to Alaska in the Klondike, Yukon, Alaska, Alaska-Yukon, and The Last Great Gold Rush. Along with them a lot of equipment was ferried up to Alaska from San Francisco by boat. Along comes Mark in 2004 with the help of his friends who were out moose hunting and came across this jewel of a find. It was 100 miles outside of Nome, Alaska in an old gold camp where it ran a bipolar dynamo to produce electricity.

Mark found the owner of the land who happened to be native Alaskan, and negotiated the sale and hauled the engine out in 2005. All they found covered in the brush and permafrost disassembled was the base, flywheels, and cylinder. All the rest of the parts had to be reproduced such as the governor, igniter, and all the nuts and bolts. This is quite a rare engine so if you want to get a closer look at it, you should come out to one of our shows. Mark has quite a collection he has brought out of Alaska.
