This Old Iron By Bob Smith

At the Cal Poly Tractor and Car Show in 2010, Dan Hostetler approached me and mentioned that he had rescued an old spray rig from the outside equipment storage yard by the tractor shop and moved it into a barn on the Spadra property. He inquired if WAPA would be interested in restoring this piece. Tom Millett, Leroy Overstreet, and myself met Dan at the barn the next week for a look see. We went inside and in a back corner was the remains of a spray rig. I say remains because the engine and pump were intact but the wood tank body was a pile of lumber lying on the frame. All the pieces seemed to be there, even the original battery and buzz coil, but the engine and pump were frozen due to the fact that it spent several decades out in the elements. After close examination, the engine was a vertical Novo and the 4 piston pump was a Bean because the top of the accumulator and pressure gauge said Bean Spray Pump Company. We told Dan we would take on the task and he had it moved to the tractor shop where work could begin. It was decided at the beginning that we would leave the spray rig, engine, and pump in its current patina. That meant no repainting. Just get the pump free and the engine free and running. The first day of tear down was on September 29, 2010. The pump was taken apart and cleaned on the inside only. There was still a hint of green paint showing on the outside so we left it that way. The water hopper on the engine needed to be cleaned of all



the dirt and rust that accumulated on the inside. We discovered that the engine would not turn over because it had a frozen cam gear. We removed the flywheel and while trying to remove the cam gear, it broke in

two. We contacted Hit-N-Miss Enterprises and purchased a used cam gear and installed it. The wooden tank took some thinking to put back together. The strips of wood were different widths and were each beveled differently from the bottom to the top of the hopper. All the pieces were there except 1 piece on the front. The 2x4's on the top that held the hopper together needed to be replaced since they were broken on the ends. The wood roof covering the engine and pump was missing and had to be made. After the rig was reassembled we filled the gas tank, sprayed some starter fluid in the fuel mixer and pulled on the flywheels. It took off on the second pull.

Some history on the spray rig that Dan Hostetler told us was that it was from the original Kellogg Ranch and was used to spray the orchards. Based on the serial number on the engine which was built on February 10, 1920, that probably dates the spray rig around March or April of 1920 depending on how long Bean kept engines sitting around.

Bill Young was a charming rascal with many interests. He was born May 8, 1926 in Muskogee, Oklahoma. The entire town of Valmeyer, Illinois was flooded, so Bill graduated from high school a month early at age 16.

Mr. Young went to officer training school. It was discovered that he was unable to supinate his right arm and failed the physical exam. Bill then joined the Merchant Marines. He studied and passed tests in several capacities, including working in the ships' engine rooms.

Bill was married three times. First for twenty three years to the girl next door, next to a Japanese woman via a prearranged type marriage in a Shinto Buddhist ceremony, and twenty plus years to another Japanese lady already fluent in English. Together they bought land in Japan and ran an English language school to students of all ages.

Tamiko was killed in a car accident thirteen years ago. Bill chose to remain in Japan since the house he built was there, along with the over one hundred engines he collected. Bill's permanent residency there provided him with incredible healthcare benefits.

During his first marriage, while raising his only child, daughter Diane, Bill worked full time nights at The Gas Company. He eventually graduated from Cal Poly Pomona and became a teacher at Northview High in Covina. He taught math during the day, driver's ed. after school, and adult citizenship classes a few evenings a week. Bill earned a Master's Degree in Safety Education from UCLA during this time.

You can see that Bill worked hard in those days to support his passion for flying and rebuilding airplanes, especially old Stearman's and PT19's. Over the years, Bill was a member of Civil Air Patrol, Mason's, World Affairs Council, Japanese American club, and 'The Barn Boys'.

Heart trouble caused Bill to lose his medical clearance for his private pilot license. He then transferred his passion and became intrigued by old engines, thus his many years of involvement with WAPA.

Bill collected many old hit 'n miss engines, but his favorite may have been Bessie. He was drawn to Bessie not only because of her large lung size, but also the challenge of transporting her from Missouri (ask Rob about this) to California and getting her running again. He conquered this challenge, due to lots of help from his engine buddies, with a significant sense of savory satisfaction.
