Part 2: My Sattley "The Tear Down" By Bob Smith

As with any rusty engine or antique piece of equipment you must be careful not to break anything while taking it apart. Mother Nature takes a toll on metal and sometimes it refuses to move again. I started with the head so I could get the piston out. I put some Liquid Wrench on the two remaining head nuts and they came off with no problem. As I mentioned in part 1 someone has taken the head off not too long ago since 1 nut was missing and 1 nut and stud was missing. The carburetor was mounted to the bottom of the head so I removed the 2 bolts holding the two together. The carburetor is a cast iron vertical design with a gas bowl on the side as all one casted piece. The intake at the bottom has a spring loaded flapper to open on the intake stroke and close after. There is a manually operated throttle plate that connects to a rod that goes back and connects to an arm on the throughout bearing. This tells me that this engine is



not a hit-n-miss but rather throttle governed. The carb had 2 needle valves which were missing. One adjusted the gas from the bowl and the other adjusted the kerosene from the main tank located in the base. A nice feature about this carburetor is there is a freeze plug on the bottom of the gas bowl. The head was in very good shape aside from the rust. The exhaust pipe had rusted off or broke off flush with the head. I cut what was left in 3 pieces and knocked it out with a chisel. The threads where the pipe had broken are in decent shape to accept another pipe. The exhaust rocker arm had been broken and braised but it re-broke at the repair. The pin holding it in place was pretty rusty but with patience I managed to remove it without breaking something else. The exhaust valve had a chip on the edge but still had a good seat. The intake valve was in better shape. The interesting thing about the head is that there is a needle valve port just above the carburetor mount so you could aspirate hopper water with the kerosene to prevent ping (pre ignition). The piston was disconnected from the crank shaft and removed from the front after honing the carbon ridge smooth as not to damage the rings. After removal I noticed the ridge between the first and second piston groves had a 1" piece broken and missing. I don't know how that happened but it definitely had to be repaired. Due to the rust and no need to separate them I removed the crankshaft and flywheels as one unit. In the words of Leroy Overstreet "Why mess with mother nature when you don't need to". The gas tank in the base was badly rusted and would need to be replaced. As I said in part 1 the mag was missing along with the bracket that held it to the engine. I removed the water hopper casting from the main cylinder/crank casting. I also separated the cylinder/crank casting from the base by removing 4 bolts. Once again nothing was broken removing all these bolts.

Now that the engine has been disassembled and all parts inspected for repair or replacement, check out next month's article on "The Clean Up".

Seven Oaks Dam By Carey Stockton

Hello, fellow members. I would like to update you on the happenings at the dam. I have a few pictures of different water levels at the dam I'd like to share with you.

Photo number 1 is of the April 18, 2016 high water level of 2186.80. Photo number 2 is of the high water level on January 24, 2017, at 2230.00. This is the highest level so far this year. At this level, the Army Corp of Engineers and Orange County engineers has us release water from behind the dam.

The base level of the dam is 2100 feet, and the Army Corp of Engineers and Orange County engineers would like to keep less than 100 feet of water behind the dam to avoid doing additional instrumentation each day. So once the water level is above 2200 feet, water is released to lower the water level.

Photo number 3 is water being released at 200 cubic feet per second. This was taken on January 27, 2017. The water is dirty.

Photo number 4 is a pair of bald eagles, one of which is tagged. They arrived on February 6th and stayed for three days.

Photo number 5 is my "postcard picture", taken on February 8th and you can see the water has settled and cleared.

Just a reminder, Seven Oaks Dam is not a reservoir, but a flood control facility. After a storm, water is released at a controlled rate to minimize downstream damage. It also allows local water agencies to capture as much water as possible to replenish their supply.
